



Oral Contraceptives Over-the-Counter Working Group Updates

Dear Working Group member,

Exciting update in pivotal birth control study

Thanks to all of your support and efforts, HRA Pharma has enrolled more than 50 young teens, aged 11-14, in their actual use trial. This achievement is a huge milestone in the FDA process to make a birth control pill available over the counter in the United States and to ensure young people are not left behind when that switch occurs.

#FreeThePill Youth Council update

Advocates for Youth is excited to announce they've hired Angela Maske, M.S., to be the new coordinator for the #FreeThePill Youth Council. As a student at Georgetown University, Angela served as president of H*yas for Choice, participated in Advocates' Condom Collective program, and organized on global reproductive health issues through Advocates' International Youth

Leadership Council. She has also interned at Advocates, SIECUS, and Power to Decide, and is more than ready to hit the ground running in helping young people organize their communities to support bringing oral contraceptives over the counter!



Policy updates

[California](#), [Hawaii](#), and [Kentucky](#) have introduced bills that would cover over-the-counter contraception without requiring a prescription, and a [bill](#) is moving in Maryland that would broaden OTC contraceptive access through repealing the prohibition on the sale of OTC drugs in vending machines. In addition, several states have introduced bills that would allow pharmacists to prescribe and dispense

hormonal contraceptives, though many of these bills contain age restrictions. The **National Women's Law Center** released an **analysis** outlining how these restrictions are not evidence based and how they may harm young people.

Announcing OCs OTC research brown bag series

Join us for the very first OCs OTC research brown bag session on **Tuesday, March 30 from 12-1pm ET!** This is the first in a new quarterly series of informal sessions where working group members can learn, ask questions, and talk about research related to OCs OTC. In our first session, Allie Wollum, senior project manager at Ibis, will provide an overview of a study she led on how evidence-based information impacted clinician attitudes on moving oral contraceptives over the counter. Results of the study have been **published** in the *Journal of Women's Health*.

UK considering reclassifying two POPs

The **UK government has announced** it is considering reclassifying two types of progestin-only oral contraceptive pills to be sold at pharmacies without a prescription. The formulation under consideration is a desogestrel-containing pill. Two pharmaceutical companies, HRA Pharma and Maxwellia, had asked the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) to make their progestin-only pill products available for over the counter sale under a pharmacist's supervision. **The MHRA is accepting public comments on the reclassification of both products through March 5.** We encourage working group members to share their views!
