

Oral Contraceptives Over-the-Counter Working Group Updates

March 31, 2021

Dear Working Group member,

With an FDA submission on the horizon, we're focused on conducting research critical to ensuring an OTC birth control environment that is just, equitable, and supportive. One of the studies we're working on is a follow-up to HRA's actual use trial—we're recruiting participants from the study to learn about their experiences using a progestin-only pill in a mock-OTC setting. In an online survey, we ask about their likelihood to continue using the product if it were available OTC as well as their willingness to pay for it. We also ask about information they'd want included with the product to help them make an informed decision about whether it's right for them.

And soon, we'll be launching a study in collaboration with working group partners that work with people of color and Indigenous communities to explore the contraceptive needs, desires, preferences, and experiences of Black, Indigenous, Asian American and Pacific Islander, and Latina/Latinx people in the United States. We hope these findings can inform how our health systems can better meet the needs and desires of *all* people regarding contraceptive information and services.

We look forward to sharing the findings of these studies with you in the near future!

Policy updates

Maryland passed a bill repealing the state's prohibition on the sale of over-the-counter drugs in vending machines, and the bill is headed to the Governor's desk. This will help to broaden contraceptive access by allowing birth control such as OTC emergency contraception to be sold in vending machines. A bill allowing pharmacists to prescribe oral contraceptives was signed into law in Arkansas. Unfortunately, the bill limits pharmacists' prescribing authority to patients 18 and older. In Colorado, a bill was introduced that would include contraceptives for undocumented people through the state Medicaid program, and enable people who use Medicaid to receive a one-year supply of oral contraceptives.
